Helmut Newton Foundation

Café Benjamine

This is a wonderful café in an artistic, natural, almost non-Berlin-like setting. Located in the museum complex devoted to the great sculptor Georg Kolbe, it bears the name of Kolbe's wife, Benjamine. I discovered it many years ago while looking for a place for a portrait shoot. The building, built in 1928, has just been completely renovated, taking on Bauhaus features and colours. The menu offers a variety of organic and vegan cuisine and focuses on seasonal produce from the region.
